Attleboro Man Convicted of First Degree Murder

Bristol County District Attorney Sam Sutter announced today that Matthew Gumkowski, 33, has been convicted of first degree murder and will serve a sentence of life in prison without parole. Gumkowski was convicted by a jury of his peers in Fall River Superior Court for the killing of 50-year-old Joseph Kilrow of Attleboro.

The jury deliberated for a day and a half, for approximately 10 hours. Superior Court Judge Robert Kane presided over the case.

Gumkowski stood accused of killing Kilrow on July 10, 2011 while the two were living together at a rooming house in Attleboro, MA. Gumkowski is declared to have beaten, strangled, and stabbed Kilrow, before lighting the bed on fire.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Dennis Collins.
