Sidewalk Murals Commemorating September 11, 2001

This summer the City of New Bedford solicited local artists for sidewalk mural designs to commemorate the September 11, 2001 attacks. Four designs were selected from local artists Ron Fortier of UMass Dartmouth, Cate Nichols of Mosiacate, James Mitschmyer, and ArtWorks! staff Deb Smook, Cyndi Wish and Alicia Moretti.

Katie Hauswirth, who spearheaded the idea, said that the City welcomes other submissions for the 12 other schools in the district. "This will be an ongoing project for the schools."

"Many of the children that see these murals were not born at the time of the attacks," said Hauswirth. The designs were chosen to inspire reflection on the events of September 11 and its aftermath. The designs are as varied as the artists who envisioned them.

Ron Fortier, professor of Art at UMass Dartmouth, will use active stain in the concrete to create his mural. The working title of the piece is "Tolerance Cannot be Defeated." As he describes it:

"The people, as represented by the hands of Americans of all races, are on a field of golden yellow symbolizing the warm light of unity. Blue, the predominant color, is a reminder of the crystal clear morning of 9-11-01 that was suddenly and violently shattered. The three crash sites (New York, Washington and Pennsylvania) are represented equally. At the foot of the piece, 09-11-01 and 09-11-11 commemorates the ten year anniversary juxtaposed with the time each airliner crashed."

ArtWorks! Education and Outreach Director Deb Smook, Executive Director Cyndi Wish and Artists Market Coordinator Alicia Moretti will use scrap metals, new ceramic mosaic to form a dove with an olive branch. ArtWorks! Partners for the Arts and the Community is a non-



profit community arts center located at 384 Acushnet Avenue, New Bedford.

Cate Nichols of Mosaicate, designed a tile mosaic dedicated to the 411 emergency service personnel lost that day. A red and white heart-shaped mosaic made of bits of ceramic hearts, leaves, and gems will abut blue Twin Towers containing the dates 9-11-01 and 9-10-11.

James Mitschmyer's design uses religious icons interspersed with symbols of war on five hand-made ceramic stepping stones. Progressing along the stones the symbols of war fade as the

symbols of peace become more prominent.

According to his narrative, "The religious icons, in my proposal, symbolize power and compassion. The dominant colors of the tiles being red white and blue are meant to strike a sense of patriotism and community. I include military images with the intent of honoring those men and woman who sacrifice so much so we can live in a safe free society as Americans. By making the finished form a steppingstone I hope to instill a feeling of moving forward towards a place of peace and prosperity."

Ron Fortier is currently a professor of Art at UMass Dartmouth, after teaching advertising and marketing at the Charlton College of Business, UMass Dartmouth. He received a BFA at SMU (UMass Dartmouth's precursor), and a MFA from the University of Miami. He is a member of Gallery X.

Cate Nichols was born in New Bedford and earned her BA in English/Communications from UMass Dartmouth. She has seven years experience in mosaics and is a Gallery X member. She resides in New Bedford. Mosaicate is her online studio at www.etsy.com/shop/Mosaicate.

James Mitschmyer has a BFA from Maine College of Art in 2005.

He has been a ceramic instructor and studio manager at the Sharon Arts Center in Sharon, New Hampshire. This fall he will be attending UMass Dartmouth School of Visual and Performing Arts on a graduate assistantship.

Amazing. An icon. The King of Blues. The Ambassador of the Blues. These are some of the usual terms for B.B. King, who at 86 years old next month still does 200 shows a year on tour. And now this blues legend will be playing at the Zeiterion Performing Arts Center on Sunday September 4th Labor Day weekend.

AND James Montgomery, a blues legend in his own right, will open for him. How did New Bedford rate such talent?

Perhaps it was Zeiterion's Special Projects and Contemporary Music staff, Greg Morton, who in another life 30 years ago was the lead bass player for Duke and the Drivers, a band that James Montgomery worked with and still speaks of highly.

"Greg was a collector of obscure R&B," says Montgomery. "He got me into bands I'd never heard of like Betty Wright and "The Clean Up Woman." Gregg is a musicologist. He's well respected in the music business in the northern part of the country," he said.



Morton was far more humble. He mentioned his bass days and called James Montgomery "the gentleman of the blues." As for B.B. King, Morton said it was a matter of luck and timing.

"B.B. played every year at the Cape Cod Melody Tent so that precluded us from booking him. This year we lucked out. He didn't play Cape Cod and we were able to book him here. Both stars [of luck and timing] aligned, and we got him here," said Morton.

Morton also said it was the team of professionals at the Zeiterion that has developed a reputation for high quality programming. Gregg said their goal is to bring the highest level of entertainment to the Z, whether music, comedy or theater.

"We've had Yo Yo Ma, Wynton Marsalis, Jerry Lee Lewis, James Brown, and Lily Tomlin. Bill Cosby is opening the season this year," he said.

And now B.B. King at the Z, with James Montgomery opening. It doesn't get better than that. There are still some good seats left, although it's likely show will be sold out soon.

Free Civil War Trading Cards

Trading cards have been popular for generations, from images of sports figures to movie stars. Now, New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park is offering free trading cards featuring figures of the Civil War who had ties to the city.

The ten cards available at New Bedford are part of a series of 189 cards that may be obtained at participating national parks throughout the northeastern United States while the National Park Service observes the Civil War 150th anniversary (2011-2015). Ways to "earn" a trading card include participating in a ranger-led tour or answering a question about their visit to the park.

While the cards address both major battles and famous generals, they also tell the story of everyday people who participated in the Civil War. One card, for example, features William Carney of New Bedford, who was wounded three

times during the bloody assault on Fort Wagner near Charleston, South Carolina. For his bravery in the battle, he became the first African-American to earn the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military award.

"The trading cards are vehicles for telling some 'lesserknown' stories—including the stories of civilians, women, and African-Americans," said Superintendent Jen Nersesian. "The trading cards are a great way to engage us in our history as a nation, both here in New Bedford and throughout the northeast United States." According to Superintendent Nersesian, the cards also provide an incentive to families to visit all 23 parks which offer the cards. Visitors may earn a set of Civil War Trading Cards at New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park in the following ways: Bring in trading cards to the information desk from another participating site; Take a photo in front of 54th Regiment Plaza on William Street and show it to park staff; Download "54," The Youth Ambassador Program from (YAP!)song, SoundCloud (http://soundcloud.com/yap-2/54yap) and show your Ipod to the information desk staff or recite lyrics from the song; Visit the park's website at www.nps.gov/nebe and answer one of the questions about the 54th Regiment. In addition, all activeduty military, veterans, and their families qualify to receive a set of trading cards. A visit to two or more participating parks qualifies children (18 years of age and younger) to receive a free Civil War backpack simply by showing a card from another park.



For over 10 years, Dartmouth native Jay Burke has been working to complete his first feature-length film, Whaling City. What began as a script he wrote as a student at Columbia Film School, Whaling City is finally nearing completion. It tells the story of Sean, a third-generation independent commercial fisherman, struggling to keep a grasp on his way of life, and a long-held family boat. This multi-year project could not have been possible without the help of the local community and those who had a hand in its creation have been patiently waiting for the film's release.




She delivers "Postcards from Heaven," solace to those who want to re-connect with loved ones in the afterlife. Mom, comedienne, and medium Maureen Hancock comes to the Zeiterion tonight at 7:30 p.m. Tickets can be purchased here.

According to her memoir, "The Medium Next Door—Adventures of a Real-Life Ghost Whisperer," it started when she was a child—hearing and seeing dead people, that is. But she suppressed much of it until a near fatal car crash reawakened the ability to communicate with the dead in 1992. Still, she did not go public with her talent until after September 11, 2001. That tragedy left her with the conviction that she needed to share her ability with others. She began performing to larger audiences at local clubs and cafes.

Along with her book hitting the stands this summer, on July 30^{th} Ms. Hancock was featured in the one-hour documentary "Psychic in Suburbia" on the Style network produced by Sander/Moss, executive producers of ABC's "Ghost Whisperer." The show highlights her teaching two mediums-in-training, her nieces Candace and Stassia, at her suburban Boston home where she's a typical mom, wife, and, oh yes, psychic.

The book, the documentary, and now the Postcards Tour are all part of a dream to reach as many people as possible. That reach extends to those in need when loved ones go missing. Tax Free Weekend in Massachusetts (13-14 August)

Get your wallets and credit cards ready because Massachusetts has brought back a tax-free weekend (August 13-14, 2011) for most sales in the state. At one time the tax-free holiday was an annual event, but was stopped in 2009 due to state budget short-falls. Despite heavy criticism, Governor Deval Patrick brought the tax-free weekend back, by signing a tax-free bill into law on August 1st, 2011. While this tax-free weekend will reduce state tax revue by an estimated \$20 million, retailers are jumping for joy because it will boost their bottom line in a time when sales are usually down.

Massachusetts is the 19th state to offer a sales tax-free holiday. Currently, Rhode Island does not have one. Consumers from the state of Rhode Island will be traveling, crossing borders to save, which will also add to purchases this weekend. New Hampshire does not have a tax-free holiday because they don't have a sales tax in the state.

What are the stipulations for the sales tax free holiday?



- •Any item or items that are purchased for less than \$2,500 are not subject to state sales tax (6.25%): anything that is for personal use.
- Alcohol does fall under this the tax free exemption, which helps since the state started to tax alcohol back in 2009.
- Any item that is purchased by a corporation is subject to the state sales tax.
- Motor vehicles, boats, meals, gas and tobacco products are taxed.
- Clothing. No sales tax unless cost exceeds \$175. For example, if you buy an expensive pocket book for \$400, it is tax free, but if you buy a wedding dress for \$2,550; tax is due on \$2,375 (\$2,550 \$175). Per www.mass.gov.
- Multiple items. Buying multiple items on one receipt totaling over \$2,500 is not subject to tax. For example, a TV \$800, Stove \$1,200, TV stand \$600, all totaling \$2,600 is not taxed. However, items that are bundled for an amount over \$2,500 are taxed! For example, a computer, monitor, and printer are bundled for a price of \$2,700 will be taxed.
- Coupons. You may use coupons on an item that brings the price down under the \$2,500. For example, if you buy a furniture piece that costs \$2,575 and you have a coupon promotion for \$200 off of the piece of furniture, the

total purchase price is now \$2,375, and so it is not taxed.

• Internet Sales. The same rules apply to any purchase made over the internet on the sales tax free holiday weekend.

This can be a good time for families that need to purchase items and want to save some money. Even though you're technically only saving 6.25%, every bit helps. Experts say consumers should focus on things you need. For example, making purchases like lumber and other items to renovate your home are good items to purchase this weekend. My recommendation is to shop early because the lines will be longer and the stores to be much busier than usual.

Regardless of what you purchase, this tax-free weekend is a win for consumers and retailers and we all love the feeling of saving money. For more information on this event go to www.mass.gov.
