### UMass Dartmouth professor awarded Manning Prize for teaching excellence

Five University of Massachusetts faculty — one from each UMass campus — have been awarded the 2019 Manning Prize for Excellence in Teaching for their exemplary dedication to students and the university. The winner from UMass Dartmouth

is Shannon Jenkins of the Department of Political Science. Since 2004, Jenkins has been a Professor of Political Science, served as chair of the political science department from 2012 to 2018, and currently serves as the Academic Director of Online Learning.

UMass Lowell alumni Rob and Donna Manning established the Manning Prize in 2016 to honor UMass professors who excel in teaching and service. Manning is Chairman and Co-CEO of MFS Investment Management and chairs the Board of Trustees for the University of Massachusetts.

"These incredible faculty members work tirelessly to ensure that UMass students receive a world-class education," said Rob Manning, a 1984 graduate of UMass Lowell. "Donna and I know from our own experience the power that faculty have to transform their students' lives, and we're proud to be able to honor that aspect of their work with this prize."

Jenkins primary research focuses on decision-making in state legislatures, with a specific focus on the role of political organizations and gender in shaping outputs in these institutions. Jenkins has also researched the effect of engaged learning pedagogies on college students' political interest and engagement. She is the author/co-author of three books and has received two Fulbright Awards, one in China in 2012 and one in Japan in 2019.

Jenkins' unique pedagogy is born out of an attempt to combat the disengagement of students with the political process. While rooted in the field of political science, Jenkins understands her work as inseparable from the larger mission of higher education. To promote these values to students, Jenkins' teaching blends civic engagement and political engagement in innovative ways.

# Victim of last week's Westport Hit and Run has passed away

The victim of last week's hit and run incident in Westport has died at Rhode Island Hospital as a result of the injuries she sustained. Stephanie Tripp, of Fall River, was 30-years-old.

Investigators today are renewing their call for public assistance in their efforts to locate and apprehend the driver of the car that struck Ms. Tripp last Tuesday on Old Bedford Road in Westport.

Police and prosecutors have been able to discern the type of vehicle likely involved in the fatal hit and run.

It is now believed the vehicle that struck the pedestrian was a gray BMW 3 Series vehicle. The vehicle is likely a model from 1999 through 2005, and should have sustained minor damage to its hood, front end and/or front passenger side.

Police are actively seeking the public's assistance in locating witnesses to a hit and run.

Westport Police received a 911 call at 8:15 pm last Tuesday evening to report a crash and a severely injured woman in the area of 288 Old Bedford Road. When first responders arrived, they located the victim, Stephanie Tripp face down in the breakdown lane suffering from major injuries. The victim was rushed to Rhode Island Hospital, where she remained in critical condition until her death this morning.

A preliminary investigation has revealed the victim was

walking along the side of the roadway when she was struck by a BMW. The male operator of the vehicle exited the car and apparently told a witness he was sorry and didn't mean to hit the victim. A witness told the driver to stay on the scene, but as the witness was providing aid to the victim, the driver sped off in an easterly direction on Old Bedford Road. Another witness attempted to follow the suspect's vehicle, which, according to the witness, was traveling at high rates of speed and passing vehicles by passing into the opposite travel lane. The witness lost the suspect's vehicle in the area of Faunce Corner Road in Dartmouth.

The vehicle's last known location was a the corner of Old Fall River Road and Faunce Corner Road in Dartmouth. The vehicle may have sustained minor front end damage.

Although officers spoke with several witnesses who remained on scene, there is reason to believe that other witnesses may have seen the crash, the vehicle that struck the victim or may have information about the driver.

### Orphaned Barn Owl rescued this winter is released back into the wild

"In November of 2018, a fledgling Barn Owl from Nantucket was admitted to the Cape Wildlife Center in Barnstable. The fledgling was in poor condition and suspected to be an orphan. The owl received supportive care until he was strong enough to spend time in an outdoor flight barn learning how to fly.

Barn Owls are a species of special concern in Massachusetts because of their small population size. As a young bird, his chances of surviving his first winter without his parents were concerning, so the decision was made to overwinter him and release him in the spring.

This weekend, a Massachusetts Environmental Police Lieutenant, with the assistance of the Nantucket Department of Natural Resources, transported the Barn Owl from the Wildlife Center to Nantucket Conservation Foundation property and released him back into the wild." — Massachusetts Environmental Police.





### Three New Bedford men arrested for Fentanyl distribution

On Tuesday, May 14, around 6pm, New Bedford police officers arrested three men on Fentynal and other charges. Fentanyl was responsible for 89% of all overdose deaths in Massachusetts in 2018.

According to New Bedford Police Department arrest logs, Anthony Pina, Jerom Souza, and Paul Sheehan were arrested at 114 Mill Street, Apartment #7. All three men live in the 114 Mill Street 10-unit apartment complex, but apartment #7 is registered under Paul Sheehan and Anthony Pina. Jerom Souza lives in apartment #3.

29-year old Jerom Souza is being charged with distribution of fentanyl, possession to distribute a Class a drug — second offense (8/6/2016 — Guilty) and conspiracy to violate drug laws.

33-year old Anthony Pina and 53-year old Paul Sheehan are being charged with distribution of a class A drug and conspiracy to violate drug laws.

#### New Bedford shooter sentenced to state prison

A 23-year-old New Bedford man who shot and seriously injured another New Bedford man in March 2016 was sentenced this week to serve up to eight years in state prison, Bristol County District Attorney Thomas M. Quinn III announced.

Josiahi Matos pleaded guilty in Fall River Superior Court to indictments charging him with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, armed assault in a dwelling, carrying an

illegal fire and carrying a loaded illegal firearm. He was sentenced by Judge Gregg Pasquale to serve five to eight years in state prison, followed by four years of supervised probation.

On Sunday, March 13, 2016, at approximately 11:23 am, New Bedford Police received several 911 calls regarding gunshots fired, as well as a male shot at 204 Sawyer Street. Uniformed police responded to the scene and upon their arrival, they located the victim lying on the floor within his attic apartment. As they approached the male, they observed him lying face down in a pool of blood. Officers as well as the paramedics on scene determined that the victim, who appeared to have suffered from bullet wounds, needed to be transported to Rhode Island Hospital where he was further tended to as a result of the severity of his injuries.

Police learned through their investigation that the defendant entered the victim's apartment uninvited, and after a brief verbal confrontation, he began firing his gun at the victim, striking him in the leg.

On March 14, 2016, police arrested the defendant, who was hiding in a locked room of the basement at 5 Bonneau Court, which is adjacent to the address where the shooting occurred.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Robert Digiantomaso.

"This is another example of senseless violence that could have killed the victim and endangered the public on a quiet Sunday morning," District Attorney Quinn said. "This is lawlessness and the defendant has clearly demonstrated that he is a danger and doesn't belong on the streets."

#### Man charged with stabbing two people at Rosewood Motel in Wareham

At 2:00 pm on Monday, May 13, Wareham Police responded to the Rosewood Motel for a report of two people who had been stabbed. After investigating, Officer Richard Robidoux determined that the incident had actually occurred around midnight.

Detectives further determined that the suspect, armed with a knife, had entered the first victim's motel room looking for a specific individual. After shoving that first victim, the suspect left the room and confronted the person he was looking for in the lot and began to stab him, the second victim. The first victim attempted to intervene and was slashed several times before the suspect fled the area.

Once officers were able to identify the suspect, they located him at his place of employment at 4:30 p.m. and arrested him. Samuel J. Hackett III, 34, of Buzzards Bay is charged with:

Assault and battery with a dangerous weapon (2 counts), Assault and battery (2 counts), and Armed assault in a dwelling.

This was not a random attack and the victims were treated at Tobey Hospital.
