National Park to Exhibit Two of Frederick Douglass's Books with New Bedford Connections

In September of 1838, Frederick and Anna Douglass arrived in New Bedford a mere 14 days after escaping Maryland, and Frederick's enslavement. Among their possessions were three books. One of them, a hymnal called The Seraph, will return to New Bedford this fall. Additionally, sometime after his arrival, Douglass purchased his first book, The Works of Robert Burns, probably in New Bedford. In 1869, Douglass gave the book to his son, Lewis, with the inscription, "from his affectionate father — Fredr—Douglass Oct.15 1869."
