## Narcan Issued to all Mattapoisett Police Officers

NARCAN will now be issued to all Mattapoisett Police Officers. Although the Mattapoisett Police Department has carried Narcan on its Ambulances for decades, the increase in opioid overdoses in Mattapoisett has increased drastically over the past few years prompting this proactive step of outfitting each Officer with narcan.

The opioid epidemic continues to increase and stretch across the United States and is not isolated to the larger communities and cities. In 2017, the Mattapoisett Police Department responded to approximately 20 opiate drug overdoses both non-fatal and fatal requiring the administration of narcan. As of January 23, 2018 the Mattapoisett Police Department has responded to 4 opioid overdoses already this year all requiring the administration of narcan. The rise in overdoses is believed to be associated with the increase exposure and presence of fentanyl.

Fentanyl is a synthetic (manmade) opioid that is very similar to morphine. However, it is reported that fentanyl is 50-100 times more potent than heroin and morphine. Due to the increase of fentanyl use by drug dealers, it is difficult to immediately determine if the substance is heroin, fentanyl or a mix of the two or other opioids. This unknown factor is a major contributor to the increase in opioid overdoses.

Similar to other drugs, fentanyl can be absorbed through the skin or inhaled if it becomes airborne, and due to its high potency it can be lethal in very small doses. As a result, police departments have seen an increase in overdoses including overdoses of police officers and first responders due to accidental exposures of fentanyl.

Narcan is highly successful in reversing opioid overdoses and the Police Officers of the Mattapoisett Police Department will now be able to provide quicker treatment prior to the arrival of the ambulance increasing the chance of survival.

The Mattapoisett Police Department is part of the Plymouth County Outreach Program which is a collaboration of Public Safety Agencies and Healthcare Providers. This program was created to help battle the ever increasing opioid epidemic. Following an opioid overdose a follow-up visit is conducted within 12-24 hours offering guidance and possible treatment options. The program is not limited to individuals addicted to opiates, but it is also for anyone impacted by addiction.

Any family or individual experiencing or associated with

opioid addiction is encouraged to obtain their own supply of narcan which could be life saving to a family member or friend.

## Registry of Motor Vehicles Clerk Sentenced for Role in Identity Theft Scheme

A Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles clerk was sentenced on Monday in federal court in Boston for her role in a scheme to produce false identification documents.

Kimberly Jordan, 33, of Randolph, was sentenced to eight months in prison and two years of supervised release. In October 2017, Jordan and co-conspirators Evelyn Medina, 56; Annette Gracia, 37; David Brimage, 46; and Bivian Yohanny Brea, 41, all of Boston, agreed to plead guilty to one count of producing without lawful authority an identification document or a false identification document.

In December 2017, Angel Miguel Beltre Tejada, 32, a Dominican national illegally residing in Jamaica Plain, was sentenced to two years in prison after pleading guilty to one count of aggravated identity theft. Tejada will also be subject to deportation upon completion of the sentence. In January 2018, Medina and Gracia were sentenced to 15 months in prison and one year and one day in prison, respectively.

In October 2015, law enforcement received an anonymous letter alleging that a corrupt RMV employee was providing Massachusetts identifications and driver's licenses to individuals who were using false identifications. An

investigation revealed that several Haymarket RMV clerks — Jordan, Medina, Gracia, and Brimage — were working with Brea and Tejada to fraudulently provide Massachusetts licenses and identification cards to illegal aliens for cash.

The scheme involved several steps. Tejada and Brea would obtain identification documents belonging to United States citizens in Puerto Rico and sell them to clients who were seeking legitimate identities in Massachusetts. These clients included illegal aliens, individuals who were previously deported, and an individual who admitted to previously facing drug charges. Tejada would receive several hundred dollars in cash each time he sold identification documents. Brea received up to \$2,700 per identity for her role in the scheme, which included helping clients obtain the documents and facilitating their acquisition of Massachusetts identity documents.

Typically, Brea and the client brought the stolen identities to the Haymarket RMV, where Medina, Gracia, Jordan, and/or Brimage would accept hundreds of dollars in cash to illegally issue authentic RMV documents, including Massachusetts licenses and ID cards. The clerks also accepted bribes to use the RMV's system to run queries, including Social Security number audits, to confirm that the identities the clients were stealing actually belonged to verifiable individuals.

United States Attorney Andrew E. Lelling; Michael Shea, Acting Special Agent in Charge of Homeland Security Investigations in Boston; William B. Gannon, Special Agent in Charge of the Boston Field Office of the U.S. Department of State's Diplomatic Security Service; and Colonel Kerry A. Gilpin, Superintendent of the Massachusetts State Police, made the announcement. HSI's Document and Benefit Fraud Task Force investigated the case. Assistant U.S. Attorney Eugenia M. Carris of Lelling's Public Corruption & Special Prosecutions Unit is prosecuting the cases.

## Marijuana: Gateway Drug? Depends on what you mean by "gateway"

This week, New Bedford Guide decided to reopen the age-old discussion about whether or not marijuana is a gateway drug. In the article the author claims that since recreational usage often precedes stronger drugs, it is, in fact, a stepping stone. Upon examination, however, this oft-debunked talking point—a stalwart argument from the anti-legalization community—goes up in smoke.

First, the word "gateway" is problematic. The term generally means "an entry point," in this case to narcotics and addiction. The main piece of evidence offered is the statement that "marijuana use is likely to precede use of other licit and illicit substances and the development of addiction to other substances." Here, the word "precede" means "comes before," but the implication is that it leads to more dangerous substances. This may seem like a distinction without a difference—but there is a difference, and it's important.

It is fair to say that most people addicted to things like crack cocaine, heroine or other opioids first began recreational use with marijuana. Marijuana is cheap and accessible for people during their experimental teenage years. According to the **National Institute of Drug Abuse**—the source cited in the original piece—13% of 8th graders, 30% of sophomores, and 45% of seniors had tried marijuana at least once. This is unsurprising data.

But here's the rub: as the adage goes "correlation does not equal causation." Given the fact that a small fraction of those people will go on to become drug addicts, there is clearly no evidence to suggest that marijuana causes people to try other drugs, or that the sensation fosters a desire for greater highs. The sheer number of people who have tried it—or who continue to use recreationally or medicinally—without graduating to more severe substances is damning to the central claim that it is an avenue to more nefarious drugs.

Further, alcohol—which is usually as available as the nearest liquor cabinet—is far more prevalent among those underage than weed. The **same survey** indicated 23% of 8th graders, 42% of sophomores, and 61% of seniors had tried alcohol at least once. It stands to reason that if marijuana—which alters your perception—is a gateway to other drugs, then alcohol ought to be as well. And yet, nobody seems to be arguing that alcohol is leading people down the road to drug addiction.

If marijuana were truly a gateway drug we should expect to see some statistical trends in usage between marijuana and other drugs. But that doesn't seem to be the case. In 2014, the National Survey on Drug Use and Health asserted that nearly half of all Americans have tried marijuana in some form after the age of 13. That number drops for cocaine use to nearly 15%, while less than 2% of Americans have tried heroin. Those subsequent stats would need to be much, much higher to even consider the theory.

This entire argument is an example of the post hoc ergo propter hoc fallacy—after this, therefore because of this. People who are heroin addicts may have smoked weed, but they're not addicts because they smoked weed (this is the same faulty rationale behind the now debunked theory that vaccines cause autism). This bit of logic is the central point NBG has glossed over.

There are a host of reasons why people try narcotics. Stats

vary given certain qualifiers like age, gender, socioeconomic circumstances, family history, etc. Attempting to pin addiction down to one particular cause is a fool's errand. Undoubtedly articles like NBG's are driven by the opioid crisis, but even that is better explained by the explosion of careless prescriptions, the influx of fentanyl, and the everburgeoning black market for secondhand pharmaceuticals.

Simply put: we all want someone or something to blame, but it makes no sense to point the finger at cannabis.

"Gateway drug" is a propagandistic boogeyman phrase designed to discourage people from smoking the devil's lettuce (which makes sense considering "gateway drug" was coined in the 1980s—the decade of the failed "War on Drugs"). Scientifically there is no connection. It may be the first mind-altering substance people consume (alongside alcohol), but there is no causal link between marijuana and harder drugs.

So put that in your pipe and smoke it.

#### 3. Is my house or business a good fit?

There are multiple incentives available to homeowners that the net cost of owning your own solar system is a fraction of what you are going to pay your utility company long term. The best part? Most homeowners decide to finance their systems with \$0 down.

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the average American uses 897 kWh of energy or \$215.00 per month. System owners can qualify to receive 30% of the cost refunded to them in their tax return through the Solar Investment tax credit. There is also a Massachusetts state tax credit and SREC's that are issued to the owner of the solar system for ten years.

After factoring in available incentives, the net cost of the system would be \$7,300.00. This example shows that Solar can be 89% cheaper than the utility. Because of these available incentives, the cost of solar ownership has never been lower than it is today. Unfortunately, these programs are not in place for much longer. Enrollment in the SREC program is only available for the next few months with a current deadline of March 31, 2018. Table 1 shows the breakdown of these incentives

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# Community Preservation Committee seeks public input to consider funding for 2018 projects

The City of New Bedford's Department of Planning, Housing and Community Development announced that the city's Community Preservation Committee (CPC) is hosting two public hearings on February 7 and February 13, at which CPA project proposals will be presented before the CPC. This is an opportunity for the public to comment on the project proposals being considered for funding in fiscal year 2018.

The Community Preservation Act (CPA) was adopted by New Bedford voters through a ballot question in November 2014. This statewide enabling legislation allows communities to create dedicated funding for: Open Space, Outdoor Recreational Facilities, Historic Preservation and Affordable Housing activities in the city. Oversight of this process rests with the Community Preservation Committee (CPC), the body established by the City to oversee the CPA program in New Bedford.

In June of 2017 the CPC hosted three community meetings that invited the public to provide comments and suggestions for the community's goals and objectives for Open Space, Outdoor

Recreational Facilities, Historic Preservation and Affordable Housing that were used in developing a Community Preservation Plan. The input provided by citizens at these well-attended meetings has been incorporated into the Plan, and a final Community Preservation Plan was adopted on August 22 by the CPC.

The CPA fund has over \$2.9 million available for projects and in the fall of 2017 began the application process for eligible projects. The CPC is currently in the course of reviewing the proposed projects and is conducting the public hearings in order for the applicants to present their project proposals to the CPC as well as to the community in a public setting. Once the CPC has reviewed and selected the projects, the CPC will recommend project applications to the City Council for final consideration and awarding of funds.

The two meetings will be held in City Hall at 6:00 p.m., on Wednesday, February 7 and Tuesday, February 13 in Room 314 and the following project proposals will be heard at the respective meeting dates:
