Dock-U-Mentaries Film to follow F/V Little Infant out of Provincetown



February film presents a look back to the days of wooden boats and iron men

The Dock-U-Mentaries Film Series continues this month on Friday, February 21st with a screening of 'Dad I Wanna Go Fishin' at 7 PM. Dock-U-Mentaries is a co-production of New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park and the Working Waterfront Festival. Films about the working waterfront are screened on the third Friday of each month beginning at 7:00 PM in the theater of the Corson Maritime Learning Center, located at 33 William Street in downtown New Bedford. All programs are open to the public and presented free of charge.

blood." Dad I Wanna Go Fishin' is an intimate portrait of commercial fishing on the F/V Little Infant out of Provincetown. The 90 minute film combines footage from the 1950s, 1960's and 1970's with expert narration by retired fisherman, Peter R. Cook.
