New Bedford Art Museum/ArtWorks! (NBAM/AW) is located in the heart of New Bedford's Seaport Cultural District at 608 Pleasant Street. The Museum offers engaging exhibitions and outstanding educational programs for members and visitors of all ages. Gallery hours are Wednesday through Sunday, 12pm to 5pm and Thursdays, 12pm to 9pm. Admission is \$3 for seniors and students, \$5 for adults, free for children 16 and under, and free for individuals and families with an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card. Free admission is given every Thursday from 5pm to 9pm care of New Bedford Free Public Library and the last Sunday of every month is free admission.

About Rotch-Jones-Duff House & Garden Museum

The historic house now occupied by the Rotch-Jones-Duff House & Garden Museum was built in 1834 for whaling merchant William Rotch Jr. This Greek Revival mansion, located on a full city block of formal gardens, is a National Historic Landmark, one of only 2,500 currently so named in the Nation. The period rooms of the house chronicle 150 years of economic and social evolution of the city, as reflected in the residencies of the Rotch, Jones, and Duff families. The Museum is located at 396 County Street. It is open Monday through Saturday 10pm to 4pm and Sunday from noon to 4pm. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$6 for AAA members, seniors and students, and \$3 for children (age 7-17). The museum is free for RJD members, and EBT card-holders.
